

Celebrating 25 years of community generosity and connection was a humbling moment and an opportunity to reflect and recognize the profound impact it has on your local healthcare. Behind every number in this report is a story - of healing, of hope, of lives changed. These stories remind us that philanthropy is about people and impact.

This year, the Foundation Board of Trustees disbursed \$3,489,566 to the hospital, including \$349,934 of generous in-kind donations, such as quilts, auction items, art and more. This funding is instrumental in advancing medical care and ensuring that your hospital remains equipped with the latest technology and resources to care for our patients - your family, friends and neighbours. Thank you for your generosity.

Highlights of your community's generosity include the transformational upgrade of the Nuclear Medicine Department. The \$4.2M project was fully funded through generous donations including an inspiring matching gift from the Shapiro family.

The *Dementia-Friendly Neighbourhoods* project transformed four units to better suit the needs of older adults with changes in their cognition.


Care for our youngest patients was enhanced through the implementation of the *Hugs*® Infant Security System. This system monitors the entire Women and Children's care area and ensures patients are accompanied by the appropriate guardian when leaving our hospital. The Retinal Camera for NICU is also now in service so that premature infants can be screened locally for retinopathy of prematurity.

We are grateful for the generous individuals who have included a donation to the hospital in their Will. This past year, more than \$1,108,000 was received through the estates of generous community individuals. It is our privilege to share the story of Roberta Biggs, whose bequest of more than \$1M will fund advanced medical equipment to serve your community.



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Defying the Odds: Jeff's Story of Resilience and Gratitude



Jeff Miller with his wife Kayla and their two children. After surviving two heart attacks and a stroke, Jeff is living life to the fullest, grateful for the care he received at NBRHC and passionate about giving back to the community that helped save his life.

At just 35 years old, Jeff Miller has survived not one, but three life-altering medical emergencies: two heart attacks and a stroke.

His health journey began in his mid-twenties, shortly after meeting his now-wife, Kayla. They were planning their future and dreaming of starting a family when Jeff's world was shattered - first by a heart attack, then another just a year later. Determined to regain control of his health, Jeff adopted a new lifestyle, embracing nutrition and running as important tools on his road to recovery.

In 2016, the couple welcomed their son, followed by their daughter a few years later. Life as a young, active family of four was in full swing - until everything changed again.

"I was at work, mid-email, when suddenly I couldn't type. I couldn't form sentences," Jeff recalls. He was having a stroke.

Jeff was rushed to the North Bay Regional Health Centre, where swift action and an urgent CT scan confirmed the diagnosis. Thanks to the advanced technology and expert team at NBRHC, he received lifesaving care that helped limit long-term damage and set him on the path to recovery.

"The next two weeks were a blur of tests, treatment, and slowly regaining control of my body," Jeff shares. "I'm so grateful I had access to this kind of care close to home."

Now thriving, Jeff remains committed to his health and to giving back. He's returned to endurance sports, shares his story through his blog, and organizes *The Voyageur 200*, a full day, 30, 60, 100 or 200 km gravel cycling adventure supporting local healthcare.

Jeff's story underscores the importance of having advanced diagnostic tools available locally. Tools like the state-of-the-art SPECT/CT machines used by NBRHC's Nuclear Medicine team are critical in diagnosing conditions such as heart disease, cancer, Parkinson's, and Alzheimer's. These SPECT/CT machines combine two advanced imaging technologies to provide detailed pictures of the body's internal organs and tissues, enabling earlier and more precise diagnoses.

"These machines allow us to diagnose and treat patients faster and more accurately, improving outcomes for our entire community," shares Dr. Bola Sogbein, Radiologist.

For patients like Jeff, having timely access to this technology can literally be the difference between life and death.

"I owe so much to NBRHC," Jeff says. "Without their care, I honestly don't think I'd be here today."

Dancing for Loved Ones, *Delivering Impact*

Throughout the year, community-led events play an important role in supporting the North Bay Regional Health Centre Foundation, helping ensure your hospital has the tools and resources needed to deliver exceptional care close to home. This past year, we were proud to partner with Sheri Wabie for *Dance for Someone You Love*.

When Sheri made the decision to raise funds for the Chemotherapy Unit at NBRHC, she set herself a goal of \$10,000. Never in her wildest dreams did she think she'd more than double that goal, raising more than \$23,000!

With more than 200 guests, local band '*The Unknowns*' kept the dance floor at the Mike Rodden Arena packed throughout the night. Funds were raised through ticket sales, donations and a silent auction, featuring over 45 items donated by local businesses and supporters.

Inspired by her father's cancer journey and many other friends in her community, Sheri wanted to hold an event to honour those who are affected by cancer. "This dance was about coming together for our loved ones - our neighbors, friends, parents, and children - who are facing cancer," reflects Sheri. "My family has been touched by cancer many times and we are currently supporting my dad in his battle. We felt loved and supported when our entire community came forward with such heart and generosity."

NBRHC plays an integral role in the care provided to patients with cancer. Home to the largest chemotherapy satellite clinic of the North East Cancer Centre, more than 3,000 chemotherapy treatments were provided last year.

Patients at the outpatient chemotherapy clinic receive treatment, education and support by specially trained nursing staff and pharmacists. Chemotherapy is provided on an outpatient basis, with an on-site satellite pharmacy that prepares the prescribed chemotherapy regime.

Our hospital and community are deeply grateful for the impact Sheri, and her friends and family, are having on patient care. Funding medical equipment is a shared responsibility between the government, the hospital, and your community. Events like *Dance for Someone You Love* show what's possible when people unite behind a cause they feel passionate about.

New Neighbourhoods



Last November, we welcomed donors and hospital leaders to celebrate a milestone achievement – the completion of the *Dementia-Friendly Neighbourhoods* project. Made possible by the generous support of donors, this project has transformed NBRHC's Evergreen, Willow, Cedar, and Oak Lodges (units) into environments that better serve patients with advanced neurocognitive disorders, promoting comfort, safety, and a greater sense of home.

Through thoughtful design changes and sensory features, NBRHC has created welcoming and accessible 'neighbourhoods' that aid patients in feeling connected to their surroundings. The project includes customized adhesive graphics for each patient's door, interactive murals, areas dedicated to familiar places, exit concealing graphics and more.

In Northern Ontario, where the population of older adults is steadily increasing, this project is a timely response to the region's evolving healthcare needs.

NBRHC President and CEO, Paul Heinrich, expressed his gratitude for the community's commitment to this vision, noting, "I would like to recognize


Dr. Rhea Galbraith's leadership on this impactful project. Not only has it improved patient safety, provided staff with more robust tools, and enhanced the flow of the units - but it has also set our hospital apart as a leader in dementia care. Initiatives like this will be increasingly important as our district faces a growing need for resources to serve older adults."

Your community came together to raise over \$170,000, making this vision a reality. This accomplishment will enhance and touch countless lives in the years to come.

Among those celebrating were Bob Wood (since passed, but never forgotten), former Member of Parliament living with a diagnosis of Alzheimer's, and his wife Carol, who have witnessed first-hand the importance of familiar, accessible spaces. Carol shared, "Alzheimer's has taught us the value of familiarity and consistency. Familiar places and routines are anchors that allow for a little peace in the midst of what is often a turbulent world."

"Our hospital, with its commitment to creating dementia-friendly spaces, has given us hope for what care might look like in the future. This work means the world to families like ours. We hope that the care and thoughtfulness shown here will continue to uplift those on their journey with Alzheimer's, offering them a little piece of home, wherever they may be," she added.

Every day at NBRHC, patients and families across our region experience moments of compassion, comfort, and expert care. The *Grateful Family Program* offers a meaningful way to say *"thank you"* to the dedicated care teams who make those moments possible.

Whether it was a nurse who went the extra mile, a doctor who brought reassurance during a difficult time, or a volunteer who offered a kind word when it mattered most, this program lets you recognize someone who made a real difference in your care experience.

Since its launch, the *Grateful Family Program* has honoured more than 800 caregivers, including 96 during the 2024-2025 fiscal year.

One family's story powerfully illustrates the impact of compassionate care:

"In January 2022, Luke was admitted to the Critical Care Unit with unusual symptoms. Within just 24 hours, Dr. McKenna made the critical discovery that Luke's previously treated testicular cancer had metastasized to his bones. Her expertise and quick action gave us clarity in an incredibly difficult time.

Luke and I had always planned to surprise Dr. McKenna with a special thank-you, but we

never got the chance. Even so, we want the world to know how incredible she is - both as a doctor and as a person. We were truly lucky to have her involved in Luke's initial care."

The staff were phenomenal. They showed unwavering support and kindness every single day. I needed a lot of help, and they gave it with patience and compassion.

Thanks to their dedication, I've come so far, and I truly believe I wouldn't be where I am today without them. I was hospitalized for three months, and throughout that time,

the Inpatient Rehabilitation Team helped me regain both my strength and my confidence.

I want to honour the amazing staff in Inpatient Rehabilitation Services for all they've done for me. They're more than healthcare professionals - they're heroes in my eyes. I will be forever grateful for their support, and I'm proud to say that because of them, I am moving forward on my journey with renewed hope and determination."

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A Quiet Legacy of Care: Honouring Roberta Biggs

Roberta Biggs believed in the quiet power of compassion. A lifelong resident of North Bay, she lived simply, cared deeply, and always put others first. From an early age, caring for others came naturally. When her parents travelled for work, Roberta took on the role of caregiver for her younger sisters, Terry and Molly - a responsibility she embraced with love.

That nurturing spirit led her into a fulfilling 35-year career as a primary school teacher. Whether she was teaching music, printing, or physical education, Roberta was a steady and encouraging presence in the lives of countless children. She had deep commitment to helping future generations grow and thrive.

Roberta lived a modest life. She never married, had no dependents, and spent her later years at Leisure World. With few expenses and a conservative lifestyle, her assets - including her home, cottage, and modest investments - quietly grew over time.

Years ago, when working with her lawyer to prepare her Will, Roberta made the decision to make the North Bay Regional Health Centre Foundation the beneficiary of her estate - an

expression of her belief in the importance of quality local healthcare.

Roberta passed away on December 31, 2023. Her estate had grown well beyond what she likely imagined. The result was an extraordinary and transformational \$1 million donation through her Will. Roberta's gift is an enduring legacy that will strengthen healthcare in our region for years to come.

Though Roberta quietly and modestly supported charity during her life, her final act of generosity speaks volumes about her character. Quiet, humble, and thoughtful, she lived with purpose and care - and her legacy is carrying those values forward in the lives of others.

Serving more than just North Bay!

NBRHC serves Nipissing District with a catchment of over 180,000 people. The hospital's Regional Mental Health Services provide inpatient beds in North Bay and Sudbury and outpatient and outreach services throughout the region—from Hudson Bay to Muskoka from Sault Ste. Marie to the Quebec border. NBRHC is also a provincial provider of women's forensic mental health services.

New Technology Improves Safety and Sight for Youngest Patients

Newborns, infants, and children at NBRHC are benefiting from two new advancements made possible by generous community support. The Hugs® Infant Security System and a state-of-the-art retinal camera for the NICU.



The Hugs® system currently provides safety and security to all infants and children cared for in the Women & Children Care Centre, which includes Labour & Deliver, NICU and Pediatrics. This state-of-the-art security system that is used worldwide, provides our tiniest patients and their families' protection and peace of mind that their baby will be going home with the appropriate guardians.

The new retinal camera is improving early detection of retinopathy of prematurity (ROP) - allowing premature babies to receive care, closer to home. ROP is a potentially blinding eye disorder that can affect premature infants. Traditionally performed manually by an ophthalmologist, new retinal camera technology allows clinicians to perform the retinal exam, capturing digital images. The images of the infant's retina can then be examined virtually by an ophthalmologist for signs of ROP.

In February, community donors and representatives from the NICU Charity Golf Tournament (formerly the Farquhar Chrysler Charity Golf Tournament) came together for a special demonstration of these two important advancements at NBRHC, fully funded through philanthropy.

How Generosity Creates Space for Compassionate Care

When a child is unexpectedly hospitalized, everything else falls away - jobs, schedules, and the stability of home. For Anne, whose son Alex was admitted to NBRHC for over two weeks, being present was non-negotiable. Coming from out of town, with no clear plan for where to stay, Anne was faced with more than just the fear of her son's illness. She was also carrying the weight of financial uncertainty.

Through NBRHC's social work team, Anne was introduced to the *NoahStrong Accommodations Program*, an initiative created to support caregivers like her with safe, short-term accommodations during unexpected hospital stays. "Our stay was so comforting during a very stressful time," she shared. "The financial burden was layered. I had been off work to be by my son's side." Anne is a single working mother of two. Her youngest, Alex, was living with autism and mitochondrial disease, a rare condition with no cure and limited treatment options.



Anne is grateful for the *NoahStrong Accommodations Program*, which allowed her to support her son Alex during a two week hospital stay.

The *NoahStrong Accommodations Program* meant she could stay nearby without the extra cost of a hotel or the worry of being too far away. It gave her the security to rest when possible, and the comfort of knowing she could be close when her son needed her.

The impact of this generosity goes far beyond a room key or a place to sleep. Anne describes our hospital culture as unique - having compassion embedded in every corner. From the Emergency Department to admission, every staff member made an effort to understand Alex's needs. They believe him when he said he was in pain, always acting quickly and kindly. "Everyone provided kindness and support to myself and Alex," she shared. "It is evident there is a culture of caring at your hospital from the bottom up and the top down. Everyone acts as a team."

Families facing rare diseases can encounter misunderstandings. Anne's experience was different. She was met with attentive listening, respect for Alex's sensory needs, and a commitment to exceptional care.

While Alex has since passed, his mother carries the memory of those two weeks close to her heart - a time when she and her son felt seen, respected, and supported. "As I reflect back, I do want the hospital to please know they made a difference in our lives."



The generosity of donors and our collaboration with *NoahStrong* helped make this difference. It gave a mother a place to rest and it gave her child dignity. It reminds all of us that care extends beyond medicine - it includes presence, comfort, and the power of kindness.

Honouring Gary: A Legacy of Love and Community

When Carol Jodouin speaks of her late husband Gary, she describes a kind, dedicated man who gave wholeheartedly to his family, his work, and his community.

"Gary called NBRHC his hospital," Carol says. "He believed deeply in having great healthcare close to home and gave so much of himself to make that happen."

A long-time Chartered Accountant and volunteer, Gary served on many boards, including NBRHC's Board of Directors. Whether supporting his hospital, the Canoe Club, local trails, or the Humane Society, Gary's presence was always quiet but impactful.

After his diagnosis with leukemia, Gary's final wish was to return home to NBRHC.

"Thanks to the incredible staff, we were able to be by his side at the end. I'll always be grateful for that," Carol shared.
